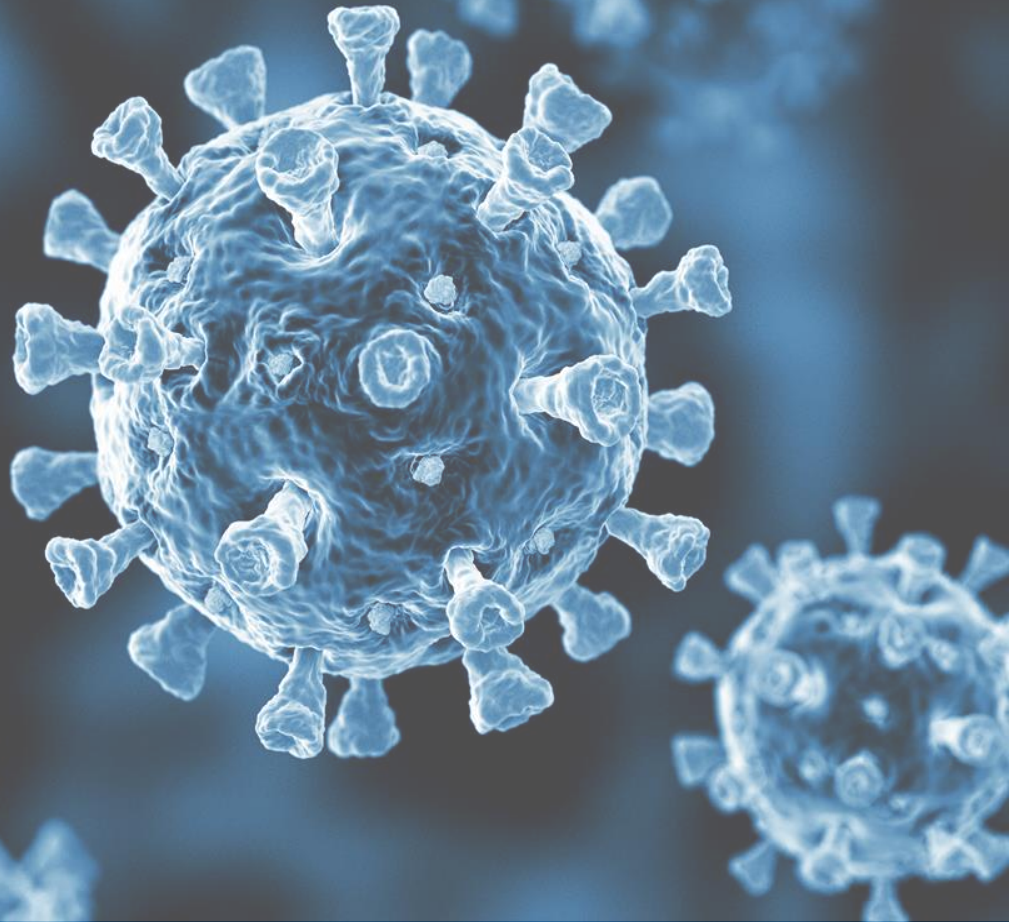

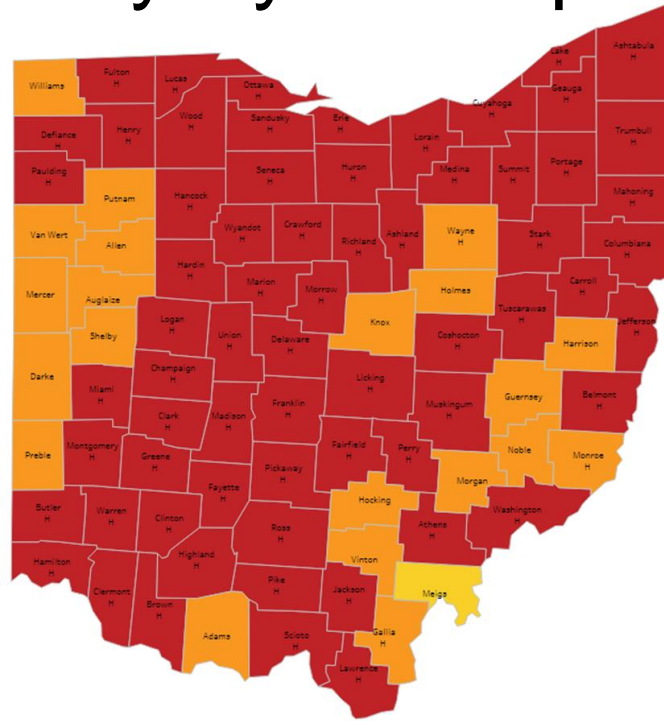

Ohio Public Health Advisory System update

Highlights

- Number of Red counties: **66** (lowest since Nov. 5)
- Number of Orange counties: **21**
- Number of Yellow counties: **1**
- **1** county dropped from Red to Yellow: Meigs.
- **9** counties dropped from Red to Orange: Adams, Darke, Guernsey, Harrison, Knox, Morgan, Preble, Putnam, Van Wert.
- **1** county moved from Yellow to Orange: Holmes.




Level 3: Very high exposure and spread. Limit activities as much as possible.

Level 2: Increased exposure and spread. Exercise high degree of caution.

Level 1: Active exposure and spread.

Governor announces benchmark needed to lift health orders



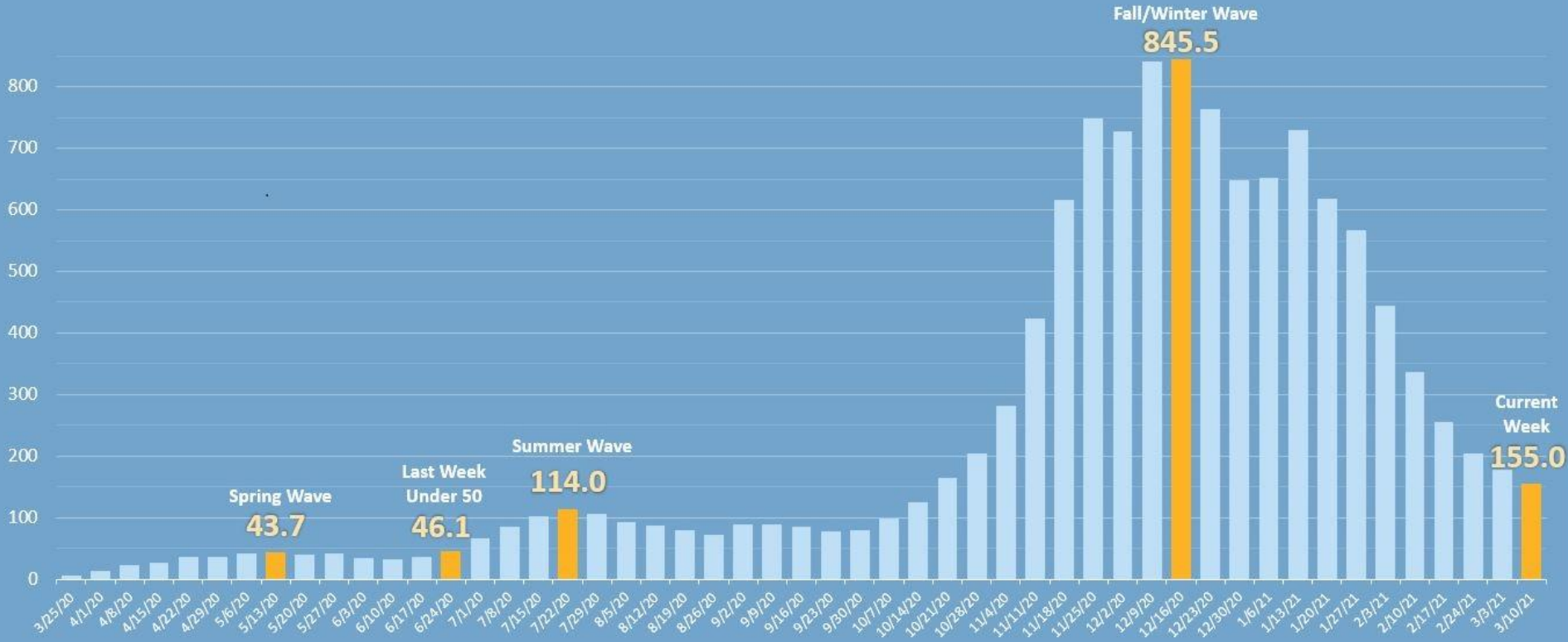
The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) COVID-19 case rate measure: Number of cases per 100,000 population.

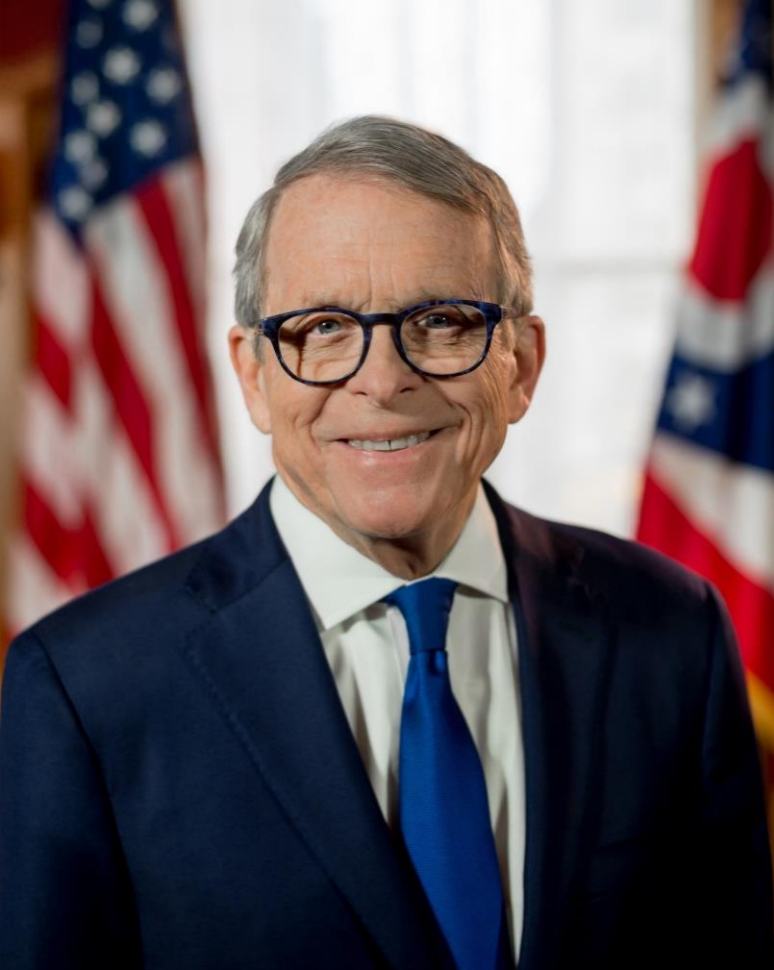
CDC says that 100 cases per 100,000 or higher reflects a high incidence of COVID-19.

Governor DeWine announced on March 4 that when Ohio reaches **50 cases per 100,000** for two weeks, all health orders will be lifted.

Ohio's COVID-19 vaccine enrolled providers

- Ohio currently has more than 2,900 enrolled vaccination providers.

COVID-19 vaccines at a glance

	Pfizer-BioNTech	Moderna	Johnson & Johnson (Janssen)
Dosage	Two doses, 21 days apart	Two doses, 28 days apart	Single dose

Clinical trials efficacy data	95% effective at preventing laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 illness in people who received two doses.	94% effective at preventing laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 illness in people who received two doses.	Full protection against hospitalization and death. 85% effective in preventing severe COVID-19, 72% effective in the U.S. (66% overall) at preventing moderate to severe COVID-19.
Side effects	Injection site pain, fatigue, headache, muscle pain, joint pain, fever. Side effects more common after second dose. Severe allergic reactions (anaphylaxis) are rare.	Injection site pain, fatigue, headache, muscle pain, joint pain, fever. Side effects more common after second dose. Severe allergic reactions (anaphylaxis) are rare. Priority populations vaccine update

- ➔ Vaccination Phases 1C, 1D, 1E, 2C, 2D.
- ➔ Regional Mass Vaccination Clinics.

Vaccine eligibility expanded

In response to a significant increase in the amount of vaccine coming into Ohio, Governor Mike DeWine has been rapidly expanding eligibility requirements.

Eligibility changes in March include:

Age

- People 50 and older are currently eligible.
- Eligibility expands to 40 and older beginning March 19.
- Eligibility expands to 16 and older beginning March 29.

Medical conditions

- Qualifying conditions beginning March 19 are cancer, chronic kidney disease (CKD), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), heart disease, and obesity.
- Recently added conditions include: Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes, end-stage renal disease, ALS, bone marrow transplant recipients, and pregnant women.

- Living with type 1 diabetes
- Pregnant
- Bone marrow transplant recipients
- Living with ALS

■ Working in:

- Childcare Services
- Funeral Services
- Law Enforcement and Corrections Officers

Ohio's Vaccination Program

A Phased Approach

PHASE 2C



Phase 2C will open vaccinations based on age, beginning with age 40 and older, because the risk of more severe reactions and outcomes of COVID-19 increases with age.



Ohio's Vaccination Program

A Phased Approach

PHASE 2D



**Beginning
March 29, 2021**

Phase 2D will open the vaccine to **all** eligible Ohioans age 16 and up.

Individuals ages 16-17 will be eligible to receive the Pfizer vaccine, the only COVID-19 vaccine authorized for use for those under age 18.

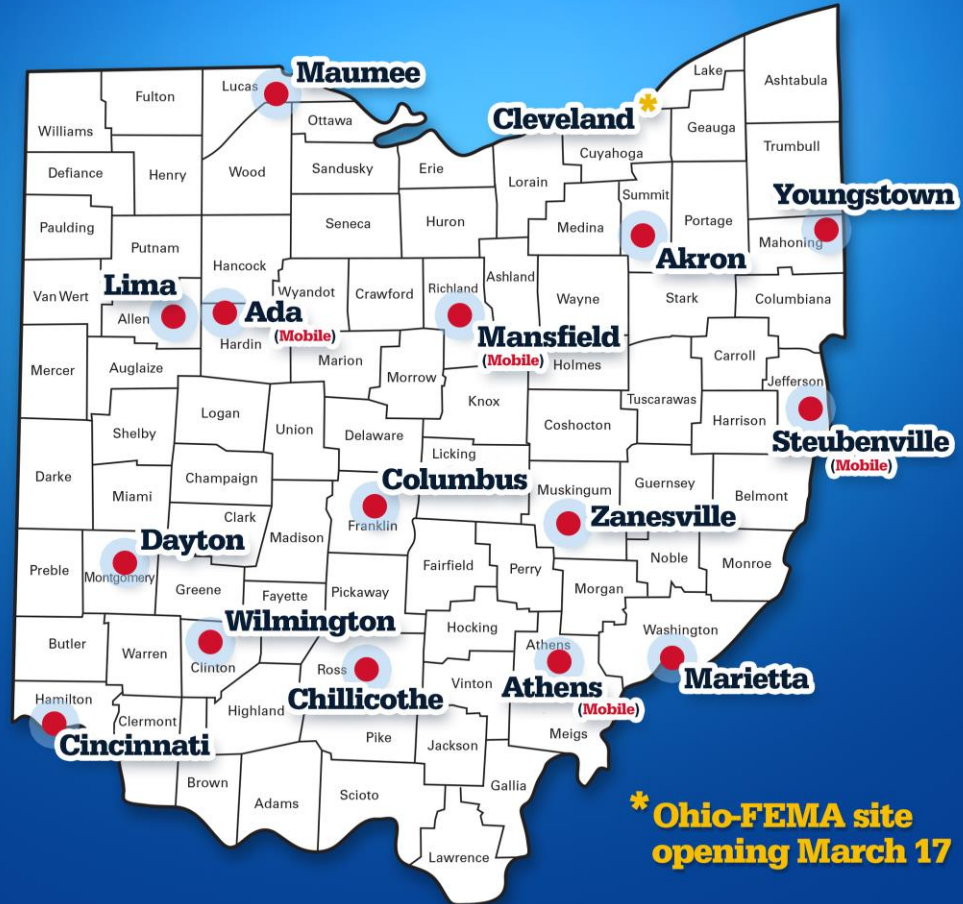
